Councillor's Corner:

Greetings from Deputy Mayor Bill Oudshoorn

Spring is morphing into summer, and this brings out the fun-lovers, and the topic for this article is one that arises every spring and discussion has occurred in council:

It pertains to off road vehicles and electric scooters being driven on our streets. Offroad vehicles such as non-licenced motorcycles and ATVs (quads and side-by-sides) are often seen driving on the streets, and often without riders wearing helmets and also with multiple riders. These vehicles are not legal for street or highway use and fall under the Traffic Act, meaning a peace officer or police officer can ticket riders. The Town of Nobleford cannot enforce the Traffic Act. This was discussed when the RCMP made their visit at the previous council meeting.

We are policed from the detachment in Coaldale, which has a new commanding Staff Sergeant, who has committed to increase patrol in Nobleford. Personally, I have seen an increased police presence over the past weeks. Let's hope this continues.

Electric scooters and e-bikes are legal to be used on our streets. Being relatively new, there are limited rules regarding them. Concerns regarding e-scooters and e-bikes include their speed and safe use. These vehicles are silent and can approach quickly while bystanders and motorists do not notice. Riding requires that the rider is courteous and aware of pedestrian and motorists around them.

I do not want to see a bylaw introduced that would create rules for these vehicles. Firstly, I believe bylaws are feckless when we do not have proper enforcement in place. We have explored the hiring of a peace officer whether part-time or full-time and realize it would come with prohibitive costs and community push back. Secondly, I believe this is an educational opportunity. Many of the riders on e-scooters are young people having fun. We need parents to be responsible for the safety of their children with the rules of the road applied. Bicycle helmet use for riders under 16 is a law in Alberta, which includes e-scooters and e-bikes. Brain damage from a seemingly simple crash can be permanent. As an owner of an e-bike, I love the freedom it gives. Let us enjoy responsibly without cumbersome rules.

Updates & Bits and Pieces of Information:

Splash Park:

Nobleford's Splash Park will be open for the season, weather permitting, from approximately June 15th until beginning of school in September. **We kindly ask all users, especially parents and caregivers, to supervise children and speak with them about respectful use of the facilities.** Unfortunately, there has been ongoing vandalism throughout the park, particularly in the washrooms. If this continues, the Town may have no choice but to close the park. Let's all do our part to keep this space safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone.

Skate Park:

The skate park is located by the Community Complex at 112 Kipp Street. It features several ramps and structures and is open to all at any time. Our Public Works Staff will repair the cracks in the foundation and clean up the area before setting up the structures. It is also being said that the rink will receive a fresh coat of paint this summer!

2026 Property Taxes – Information for Residents

The 2026 Property Tax Notices have now been mailed to residents. Included with the notices is an updated Property Tax Brochure that explains how property taxes are calculated and distributed.

A very thorough explanation on the Town's operating system can be found in the 2026 Budget Release, which is available in PDF format on our website.

The Town of Nobleford would like to clarify that the Town's municipal mill rate has not increased from 2025. Council worked to maintain the same municipal tax rate as the previous year.

However, many residents will still notice an increase in their total property taxes due to factors outside of the Town's control, including:

- Significant increases to the Alberta School Foundation Fund requisition and the RCMP requisition
- Higher property assessments for many properties, largely due to increased market values and higher-priced property sales in their neighbourhood region.

Assessments are completed by an independent assessor using provincial standards. The Town of Nobleford does not determine individual property values or assessments.

It is also important to note that only approximately 49% of the total property taxes collected remain with the Town of Nobleford. The remaining portion is collected on behalf of the Province for education and policing requisitions.

Council remains committed to maintaining responsible budgeting while continuing to provide services and infrastructure for the community.

**New Staff Sergeant:**

“The Town of Coaldale is welcoming Staff Sergeant Malcolm Callihoo as the new Detachment Commander for the Coaldale/Picture Butte RCMP Detachment. Staff Sergeant Callihoo brings more than 27 years of experience with the RCMP, having served in all four RCMP Districts in Alberta. His career has included postings in First Nations communities, rural and remote northern communities, and municipal city-based policing environments, giving him a broad understanding of the different public safety needs and priorities that exist across the province.”

Staff Sergeant Callihoo attended Nobleford’s Regular Council Meeting on May 11, 2026, where he shared his vision of increasing RCMP visibility within local communities, including Nobleford, through more proactive patrols and community presence. Council appreciated his approach and commitment to strengthening relationships within the community.

Residents are encouraged to report non-emergency incidents by calling the RCMP non-emergency line at 310-RCMP (310-7267, no area code required). In situations involving suspicious activity, such as prowlers, residents are also asked, when possible, not to clean up or disturb the area immediately so that RCMP members may have an opportunity to gather evidence.

Staff Sergeant Callihoo also addressed ongoing concerns regarding ATVs and dirt bikes being operated within town limits. Residents are encouraged to note the times and locations where these activities most commonly occur and to report them so patrols can be focused during those periods. While enforcement and ticketing will occur when necessary, the current focus remains on education and promoting safe, respectful operation.

Nobleford & Lethbridge County receive joint NRED funding:



The Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County have received a \$100,000 grant from the Government of Alberta to complete a Joint Development Feasibility Study near the Highway 519 and Highway 23 intersection.

“Through the Northern and Regional Economic Development program, Alberta’s government is giving communities across the province the tools they need to attract investment, grow local economies and create jobs for hard-working Albertans,” said Joseph Schow, Minister of Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration. “We look forward to seeing how the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County use this funding to unlock new opportunities for economic development and employment.”

The study will explore the area’s potential for future commercial and industrial development. Located within the Town and County’s Intermunicipal Development Plan boundary, the site is well positioned near key transportation routes, municipal servicing and agri-food processors.

While the area has strong development potential, there are current barriers to investment, including uncertainty around infrastructure capacity, land servicing, and market demand. The study will help both municipalities better understand what is needed to support coordinated, investment-ready growth.

The joint study will:

- Evaluate current infrastructure capacity and identify opportunities for shared servicing strategies.
- Assess land suitability for development.
- Conduct a market demand analysis to understand regional economic potential.
- Complete a financial analysis to assess the viability of infrastructure investment and long-term servicing models.
- Explore governance and cost-sharing models for future growth coordination.

It is anticipated that work on the study will begin in June and be completed by Spring 2027.

The Town and County see value in pursuing joint development opportunities that maximize infrastructure investment and position the region as a competitive, collaborative destination for economic growth.

"This grant is a great opportunity for both the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County," says Town of Nobleford Mayor Joan Boeder. "Development like this does not happen in isolation, and we are excited to work alongside the County to understand what this area could become. When neighbouring municipalities collaborate, everyone benefits. We are looking forward to seeing what this study unlocks for our region."

"We recognize how critical regional collaboration is to attracting growth and investment," says Lethbridge County Reeve Tory Campbell. "This study opens the door to cost-effective, scalable servicing solutions that can benefit both municipalities. When we plan for the future together, we can build on our shared strengths, remove barriers to investment, and create long-term opportunities for our region."

Funding for this study is provided by the Government of Alberta through the Northern and Regional Economic Development (NRED) program, which supports projects that promote economic development and diversification in Alberta. This joint feasibility study supports the strategic visions of both Lethbridge County and the Town of Nobleford by laying the groundwork for coordinated, investment-ready development.

FIRE / RESCUE SERVICES

We are a 100% volunteer-based department that responds to all call types including but not limited to;

- Structure / Vehicle Fires
- Motor Vehicle Collisions
- Wildland / Grassland Fires
- Medical First Response
- Hazardous Materials Response
- Citizen Assists
- All other Fire / Rescue Emergencies

Our members respond to any type of emergency at all times of the day and night year-round. When you see our units leaving the Fire Station, or on the roadway, we are enroute to any specified emergency scene. Our members constantly sacrifice time away from family, work, weekends, family functions, holidays, birthdays, anniversaries and almost every other type of event you can think of not go help people in need. They do this for the care of the people that live and travel through this great community.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

Under AHS /MFR program (Medical First Response), we train and respond to all medical call types.

Below is a description of our Medical Response:

- We fall under a medical director
- We have on call teams for each week of the month, in rotation of 5 teams of 204 members, with an officer in lead. (For evening shifts 9pm-5am)
- We offer all PPE / equipment needed for our first responders
- We care and package patients involved in MVC's
- Provide all pre hospital treatment prior to ambulances arrival
- MFR – Standard First Aid – HCP / AED providers (Level of Care)
- We have been trained in opioid responses with Narcan
- Pandemic response plans are identified by AHS and our members are up to date with proper procedures.

We respond accordingly based on our SOP'S for the following baseline medical response levels:

LOW	MILD	MEDIUM	SEVERE	EXTREME

We have 3 levels of ambulances that attend our response zone,

- STARS – Calgary

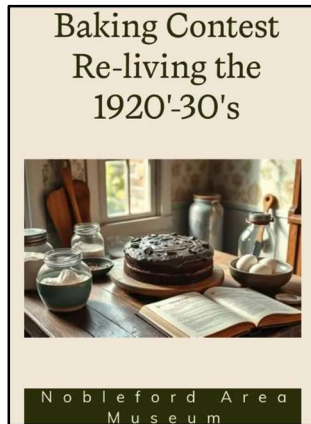
Nobleford and Area Museum Society:

 1/4 cup Sugar (and a little more to sprinkle on top)
 3/4 cup Haskap Raisins

Directions

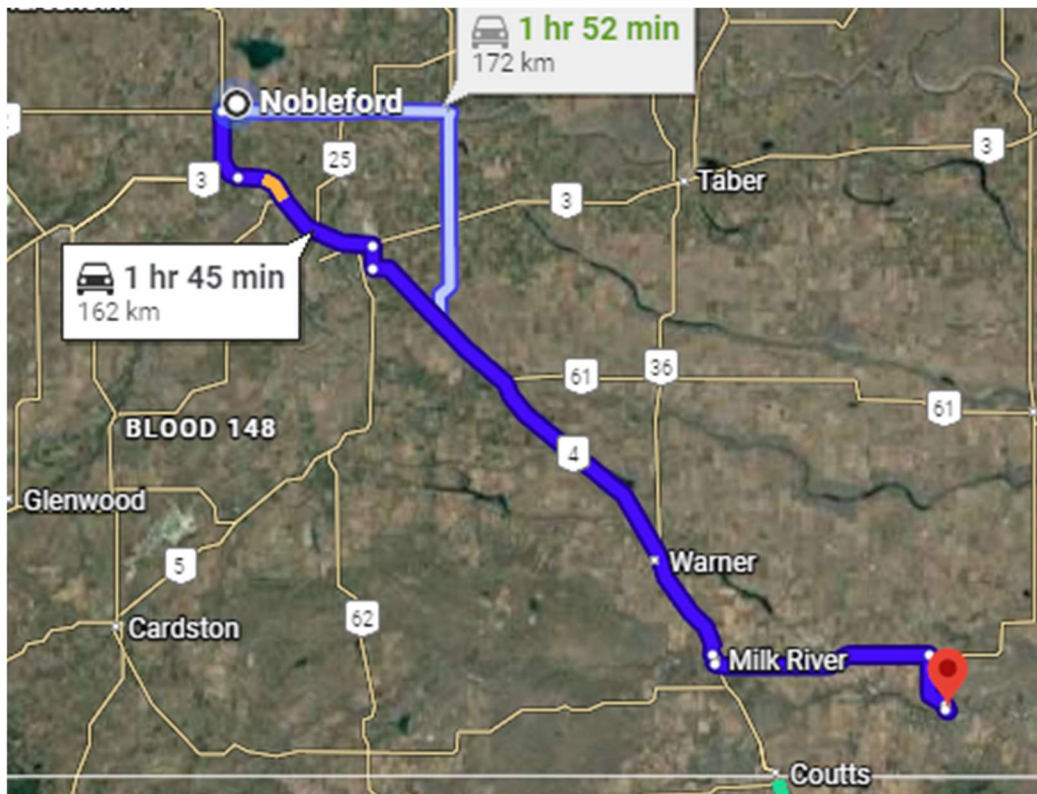
1. Mix potato granules with hot water and stir until thick and smooth. Let cool.
2. In another bowl, combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add haskap raisins and mix.
3. Add egg and milk to potatoes and stir into crumb mixture. Turn onto floured surface, knead gently until no longer sticky.
4. Pat dough into a 9 inch round (23 cm), about ¼ in thick (2 cm). Cut into 10-12 wedges. Place wedges on parchment lined baking sheet. Brush tops with milk. Bake at 400°F for 15-18 minutes or until golden brown.

Councillor's Corner:

Greetings from Deputy Mayor Bill Oudshoorn

Spring is morphing into summer, and this brings out the fun-lovers, and the topic for this article is one that arises every spring and discussion has occurred in council:

It pertains to off road vehicles and electric scooters being driven on our streets. Offroad vehicles such as non-licenced motorcycles and ATVs (quads and side-by-sides) are often seen driving on the streets, and often without riders wearing helmets and also with multiple riders. These vehicles are not legal for street or highway use and fall under the Traffic Act, meaning a peace officer or police officer can ticket riders. The Town of Nobleford cannot enforce the Traffic Act. This was discussed when the RCMP made their visit at the previous council meeting.

We are policed from the detachment in Coaldale, which has a new commanding Staff Sergeant, who has committed to increase patrol in Nobleford. Personally, I have seen an increased police presence over the past weeks. Let's hope this continues.

Electric scooters and e-bikes are legal to be used on our streets. Being relatively new, there are limited rules regarding them. Concerns regarding e-scooters and e-bikes include their speed and safe use. These vehicles are silent and can approach quickly while bystanders and motorists do not notice. Riding requires that the rider is courteous and aware of pedestrian and motorists around them.

I do not want to see a bylaw introduced that would create rules for these vehicles. Firstly, I believe bylaws are feckless when we do not have proper enforcement in place. We have explored the hiring of a peace officer whether part-time or full-time and realize it would come with prohibitive costs and community push back. Secondly, I believe this is an educational opportunity. Many of the riders on e-scooters are young people having fun. We need parents to be responsible for the safety of their children with the rules of the road applied. Bicycle helmet use for riders under 16 is a law in Alberta, which includes e-scooters and e-bikes. Brain damage from a seemingly simple crash can be permanent. As an owner of an e-bike, I love the freedom it gives. Let us enjoy responsibly without cumbersome rules.

Updates & Bits and Pieces of Information:

Splash Park:

Nobleford's Splash Park will be open for the season, weather permitting, from approximately June 15th until beginning of school in September. **We kindly ask all users, especially parents and caregivers, to supervise children and speak with them about respectful use of the facilities.** Unfortunately, there has been ongoing vandalism throughout the park, particularly in the washrooms. If this continues, the Town may have no choice but to close the park. Let's all do our part to keep this space safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone.

Skate Park:

The skate park is located by the Community Complex at 112 Kipp Street. It features several ramps and structures and is open to all at any time. Our Public Works Staff will repair the cracks in the foundation and clean up the area before setting up the structures. It is also being said that the rink will receive a fresh coat of paint this summer!

2026 Property Taxes – Information for Residents

The 2026 Property Tax Notices have now been mailed to residents. Included with the notices is an updated Property Tax Brochure that explains how property taxes are calculated and distributed.

The Town of Nobleford would like to clarify that the Town's municipal mill rate has not increased from 2025. Council worked to maintain the same municipal tax rate as the previous year.

However, many residents will still notice an increase in their total property taxes due to factors outside of the Town's control, including:

- Significant increases to the Alberta School Foundation Fund requisition and the RCMP requisition
- Higher property assessments for many properties, largely due to increased market values and higher-priced property sales in their neighbourhood region.

Assessments are completed by an independent assessor using provincial standards. The Town of Nobleford does not determine individual property values or assessments.

It is also important to note that only approximately 49% of the total property taxes collected remain with the Town of Nobleford. The remaining portion is collected on behalf of the Province for education and policing requisitions.

Council remains committed to maintaining responsible budgeting while continuing to provide services and infrastructure for the community.

**New Staff Sergeant:**

“The Town of Coaldale is welcoming Staff Sergeant Malcolm Callihoo as the new Detachment Commander for the Coaldale/Picture Butte RCMP Detachment. Staff Sergeant Callihoo brings more than 27 years of experience with the RCMP, having served in all four RCMP Districts in Alberta. His career has included postings in First Nations communities, rural and remote northern communities, and municipal city-based policing environments, giving him a broad understanding of the different public safety needs and priorities that exist across the province.”

Staff Sergeant Callihoo attended Nobleford’s Regular Council Meeting on May 11, 2026, where he shared his vision of increasing RCMP visibility within local communities, including Nobleford, through more proactive patrols and community presence. Council appreciated his approach and commitment to strengthening relationships within the community.

Residents are encouraged to report non-emergency incidents by calling the RCMP non-emergency line at 310-RCMP (310-7267, no area code required). In situations involving suspicious activity, such as prowlers, residents are also asked, when possible, not to clean up or disturb the area immediately so that RCMP members may have an opportunity to gather evidence.

Staff Sergeant Callihoo also addressed ongoing concerns regarding ATVs and dirt bikes being operated within town limits. Residents are encouraged to note the times and locations where these activities most commonly occur and to report them so patrols can be focused during those periods. While enforcement and ticketing will occur when necessary, the current focus remains on education and promoting safe, respectful operation.

Nobleford & Lethbridge County receive joint NRED funding:



The Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County have received a \$100,000 grant from the Government of Alberta to complete a Joint Development Feasibility Study near the Highway 519 and Highway 23 intersection.

“Through the Northern and Regional Economic Development program, Alberta’s government is giving communities across the province the tools they need to attract investment, grow local economies and create jobs for hard-working Albertans,” said Joseph Schow, Minister of Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration. “We look forward to seeing how the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County use this funding to unlock new opportunities for economic development and employment.”

The study will explore the area’s potential for future commercial and industrial development. Located within the Town and County’s Intermunicipal Development Plan boundary, the site is well positioned near key transportation routes, municipal servicing and agri-food processors.

While the area has strong development potential, there are current barriers to investment, including uncertainty around infrastructure capacity, land servicing, and market demand. The study will help both municipalities better understand what is needed to support coordinated, investment-ready growth.

The joint study will:

- Evaluate current infrastructure capacity and identify opportunities for shared servicing strategies.
- Assess land suitability for development.
- Conduct a market demand analysis to understand regional economic potential.
- Complete a financial analysis to assess the viability of infrastructure investment and long-term servicing models.
- Explore governance and cost-sharing models for future growth coordination.

It is anticipated that work on the study will begin in June and be completed by Spring 2027.

The Town and County see value in pursuing joint development opportunities that maximize infrastructure investment and position the region as a competitive, collaborative destination for economic growth.

"This grant is a great opportunity for both the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County," says Town of Nobleford Mayor Joan Boeder. "Development like this does not happen in isolation, and we are excited to work alongside the County to understand what this area could become. When neighbouring municipalities collaborate, everyone benefits. We are looking forward to seeing what this study unlocks for our region."

"This study opens the door to cost-effective, scalable servicing solutions that can benefit both municipalities. When we plan for the future together, we can build on our shared strengths, remove barriers to investment, and create long-term opportunities for our region."

Funding for this study is provided by the Government of Alberta through the Northern and Regional Economic Development (NRED) program, which supports projects that promote economic development and diversification in Alberta. This joint feasibility study supports the strategic visions of both Lethbridge County and the Town of Nobleford by laying the groundwork for coordinated, investment-ready development.

FIRE / RESCUE SERVICES

We are a 100% volunteer-based department that responds to all call types including but not limited to;

- Structure / Vehicle Fires
- Motor Vehicle Collisions
- Wildland / Grassland Fires
- Medical First Response
- Hazardous Materials Response
- Citizen Assists
- All other Fire / Rescue Emergencies

Our members respond to any type of emergency at all times of the day and night year-round. When you see our units leaving the Fire Station, or on the roadway, we are enroute to any specified emergency scene. Our members constantly sacrifice time away from family, work, weekends, family functions, holidays, birthdays, anniversaries and almost every other type of event you can think of not go help people in need. They do this for the care of the people that live and travel through this great community.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

Under AHS /MFR program (Medical First Response), we train and respond to all medical call types.

Below is a description of our Medical Response:

- We fall under a medical director
- We have on call teams for each week of the month, in rotation of 5 teams of 204 members, with an officer in lead. (For evening shifts 9pm-5am)
- We offer all PPE / equipment needed for our first responders
- We care and package patients involved in MVC's
- Provide all pre hospital treatment prior to ambulances arrival
- MFR – Standard First Aid – HCP / AED providers (Level of Care)
- We have been trained in opioid responses with Narcan
- Pandemic response plans are identified by AHS and our members are up to date with proper procedures.

We respond accordingly based on our SOP'S for the following baseline medical response levels:

Ingredients

3 Cups Navy Beans, soaked & cooked
 ½ Cup Green Onions, thinly sliced
 ¼ Cup Kalamata Olives, sliced & pitted
 ¼ Cup Sun-dried Tomatoes, chopped & drained
 1 Tbsp Fresh Rosemary, chopped
 2 Tbsp Vinegar (sherry, cider or balsamic)

2 Tbsp Luco Farms Mustard (Prairie Lightning if you like heat!)
 ½ tsp Salt
 1/8 tsp Fresh Ground Black Pepper
 ¼ Cup Olive Oil

Ingredients

¼ cup Prairie Hill Farms Potato Granules
 1 cup Hot Water
 2 cups All Purpose Flour
 1 tsp Salt
 3 Tbsp Cold Butter

1/3 cup Milk (and a little more to brush on tops)
 1 Egg
 1/4 cup Sugar (and a little more to sprinkle on top)
 3/4 cup Haskap Raisins

Directions

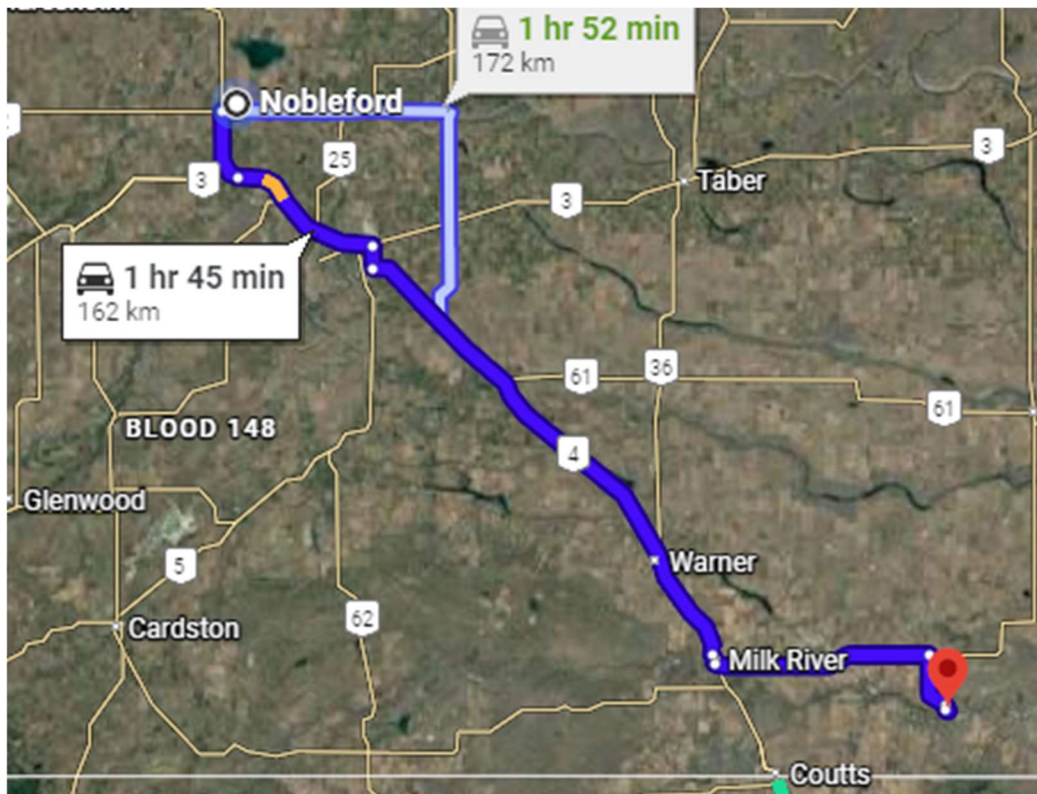
1. Mix potato granules with hot water and stir until thick and smooth. Let cool.
2. In another bowl, combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add haskap raisins and mix.
3. Add egg and milk to potatoes and stir into crumb mixture. Turn onto floured surface, knead gently until no longer sticky.
4. Pat dough into a 9 inch round (23 cm), about ¼ in thick (2 cm). Cut into 10-12 wedges. Place wedges on parchment lined baking sheet. Brush tops with milk. Bake at 400°F for 15-18 minutes or until golden brown.

- Inspect decks and patios for rot or loose boards.
- Check for pest entry points and seal gaps.

Councillor's Corner:

Greetings from Deputy Mayor Bill Oudshoorn

Spring is morphing into summer, and this brings out the fun-lovers, and the topic for this article is one that arises every spring and discussion has occurred in council:

It pertains to off road vehicles and electric scooters being driven on our streets. Offroad vehicles such as non-licenced motorcycles and ATVs (quads and side-by-sides) are often seen driving on the streets, and often without riders wearing helmets and also with multiple riders. These vehicles are not legal for street or highway use and fall under the Traffic Act, meaning a peace officer or police officer can ticket riders. The Town of Nobleford cannot enforce the Traffic Act. This was discussed when the RCMP made their visit at the previous council meeting.

We are policed from the detachment in Coaldale, which has a new commanding Staff Sergeant, who has committed to increase patrol in Nobleford. Personally, I have seen an increased police presence over the past weeks. Let's hope this continues.

Electric scooters and e-bikes are legal to be used on our streets. Being relatively new, there are limited rules regarding them. Concerns regarding e-scooters and e-bikes include their speed and safe use. These vehicles are silent and can approach quickly while bystanders and motorists do not notice. Riding requires that the rider is courteous and aware of pedestrian and motorists around them.

I do not want to see a bylaw introduced that would create rules for these vehicles. Firstly, I believe bylaws are feckless when we do not have proper enforcement in place. We have explored the hiring of a peace officer whether part-time or full-time and realize it would come with prohibitive costs and community push back. Secondly, I believe this is an educational opportunity. Many of the riders on e-scooters are young people having fun. We need parents to be responsible for the safety of their children with the rules of the road applied. Bicycle helmet use for riders under 16 is a law in Alberta, which includes e-scooters and e-bikes. Brain damage from a seemingly simple crash can be permanent. As an owner of an e-bike, I love the freedom it gives. Let us enjoy responsibly without cumbersome rules.

Updates & Bits and Pieces of Information:

Splash Park:

Nobleford's Splash Park will be open for the season, weather permitting, from approximately June 15th until beginning of school in September. **We kindly ask all users, especially parents and caregivers, to supervise children and speak with them about respectful use of the facilities.** Unfortunately, there has been ongoing vandalism throughout the park, particularly in the washrooms. If this continues, the Town may have no choice but to close the park. Let's all do our part to keep this space safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone.

Skate Park:

The skate park is located by the Community Complex at 112 Kipp Street. It features several ramps and structures and is open to all at any time. Our Public Works Staff will repair the cracks in the foundation and clean up the area before setting up the structures. It is also being said that the rink will receive a fresh coat of paint this summer!

2026 Property Taxes – Information for Residents

The 2026 Property Tax Notices have now been mailed to residents. Included with the notices is an updated Property Tax Brochure that explains how property taxes are calculated and distributed.

The Town of Nobleford would like to clarify that the Town's municipal mill rate has not increased from 2025. Council worked to maintain the same municipal tax rate as the previous year.

However, many residents will still notice an increase in their total property taxes due to factors outside of the Town's control, including:

- Significant increases to the Alberta School Foundation Fund requisition and the RCMP requisition
- Higher property assessments for many properties, largely due to increased market values and higher-priced property sales in their neighbourhood region.

Assessments are completed by an independent assessor using provincial standards. The Town of Nobleford does not determine individual property values or assessments.

It is also important to note that only approximately 49% of the total property taxes collected remain with the Town of Nobleford. The remaining portion is collected on behalf of the Province for education and policing requisitions.

Council remains committed to maintaining responsible budgeting while continuing to provide services and infrastructure for the community.

**New Staff Sergeant:**

“The Town of Coaldale is welcoming Staff Sergeant Malcolm Callihoo as the new Detachment Commander for the Coaldale/Picture Butte RCMP Detachment. Staff Sergeant Callihoo brings more than 27 years of experience with the RCMP, having served in all four RCMP Districts in Alberta. His career has included postings in First Nations communities, rural and remote northern communities, and municipal city-based policing environments, giving him a broad understanding of the different public safety needs and priorities that exist across the province.”

Staff Sergeant Callihoo attended Nobleford’s Regular Council Meeting on May 11, 2026, where he shared his vision of increasing RCMP visibility within local communities, including Nobleford, through more proactive patrols and community presence. Council appreciated his approach and commitment to strengthening relationships within the community.

Residents are encouraged to report non-emergency incidents by calling the RCMP non-emergency line at 310-RCMP (310-7267, no area code required). In situations involving suspicious activity, such as prowlers, residents are also asked, when possible, not to clean up or disturb the area immediately so that RCMP members may have an opportunity to gather evidence.

Staff Sergeant Callihoo also addressed ongoing concerns regarding ATVs and dirt bikes being operated within town limits. Residents are encouraged to note the times and locations where these activities most commonly occur and to report them so patrols can be focused during those periods. While enforcement and ticketing will occur when necessary, the current focus remains on education and promoting safe, respectful operation.

Nobleford & Lethbridge County receive joint NRED funding:



The Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County have received a \$100,000 grant from the Government of Alberta to complete a Joint Development Feasibility Study near the Highway 519 and Highway 23 intersection.

“Through the Northern and Regional Economic Development program, Alberta’s government is giving communities across the province the tools they need to attract investment, grow local economies and create jobs for hard-working Albertans,” said Joseph Schow, Minister of Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration. “We look forward to seeing how the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County use this funding to unlock new opportunities for economic development and employment.”

The study will explore the area’s potential for future commercial and industrial development. Located within the Town and County’s Intermunicipal Development Plan boundary, the site is well positioned near key transportation routes, municipal servicing and agri-food processors.

While the area has strong development potential, there are current barriers to investment, including uncertainty around infrastructure capacity, land servicing, and market demand. The study will help both municipalities better understand what is needed to support coordinated, investment-ready growth.

The joint study will:

- Evaluate current infrastructure capacity and identify opportunities for shared servicing strategies.
- Assess land suitability for development.
- Conduct a market demand analysis to understand regional economic potential.
- Complete a financial analysis to assess the viability of infrastructure investment and long-term servicing models.
- Explore governance and cost-sharing models for future growth coordination.

It is anticipated that work on the study will begin in June and be completed by Spring 2027.

The Town and County see value in pursuing joint development opportunities that maximize infrastructure investment and position the region as a competitive, collaborative destination for economic growth.

"This grant is a great opportunity for both the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County," says Town of Nobleford Mayor Joan Boeder. "Development like this does not happen in isolation, and we are excited to work alongside the County to understand what this area could become. When neighbouring municipalities collaborate, everyone benefits. We are looking forward to seeing what this study unlocks for our region."

"We recognize how critical regional collaboration is to attracting growth and investment," says Lethbridge County Reeve Tory Campbell. "This study opens the door to cost-effective, scalable servicing solutions that can benefit both municipalities. When we plan for the future together, we can build on our shared strengths, remove barriers to investment, and create long-term opportunities for our region."

Funding for this study is provided by the Government of Alberta through the Northern and Regional Economic Development (NRED) program, which supports projects that promote economic development and diversification in Alberta. This joint feasibility study supports the strategic visions of both Lethbridge County and the Town of Nobleford by laying the groundwork for coordinated, investment-ready development.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

Under AHS /MFR program (Medical First Response), we train and respond to all medical call types.

- We offer all PPE / equipment needed for our first responders
- We care and package patients involved in MVC's
- Provide all pre hospital treatment prior to ambulances arrival
- MFR – Standard First Aid – HCP / AED providers (Level of Care)
- We have been trained in opioid responses with Narcan
- Pandemic response plans are identified by AHS and our members are up to date with proper procedures.

 1/4 cup Sugar (and a little more to sprinkle on top)
 3/4 cup Haskap Raisins

Directions

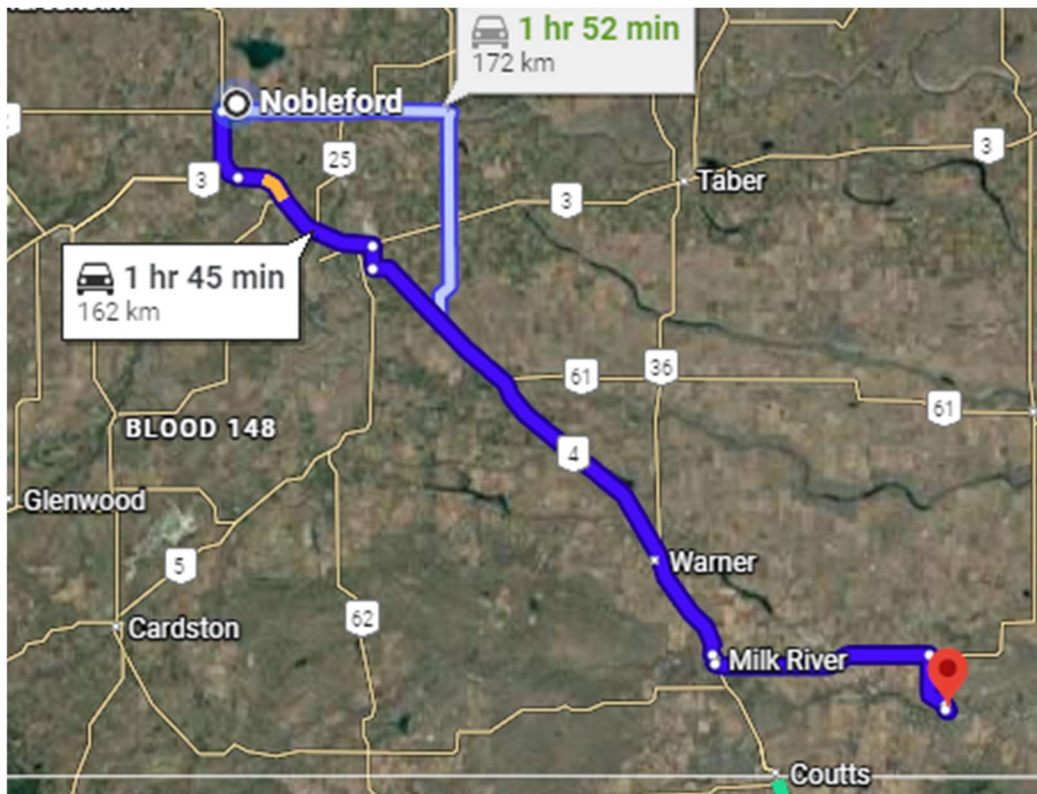
1. Mix potato granules with hot water and stir until thick and smooth. Let cool.
2. In another bowl, combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add haskap raisins and mix.
3. Add egg and milk to potatoes and stir into crumb mixture. Turn onto floured surface, knead gently until no longer sticky.
4. Pat dough into a 9 inch round (23 cm), about ¼ in thick (2 cm). Cut into 10-12 wedges. Place wedges on parchment lined baking sheet. Brush tops with milk. Bake at 400°F for 15-18 minutes or until golden brown.

Councillor's Corner:

Greetings from Deputy Mayor Bill Oudshoorn

Spring is morphing into summer, and this brings out the fun-lovers, and the topic for this article is one that arises every spring and discussion has occurred in council:

It pertains to off road vehicles and electric scooters being driven on our streets. Offroad vehicles such as non-licenced motorcycles and ATVs (quads and side-by-sides) are often seen driving on the streets, and often without riders wearing helmets and also with multiple riders. These vehicles are not legal for street or highway use and fall under the Traffic Act, meaning a peace officer or police officer can ticket riders. The Town of Nobleford cannot enforce the Traffic Act. This was discussed when the RCMP made their visit at the previous council meeting.

We are policed from the detachment in Coaldale, which has a new commanding Staff Sergeant, who has committed to increase patrol in Nobleford. Personally, I have seen an increased police presence over the past weeks. Let's hope this continues.

Electric scooters and e-bikes are legal to be used on our streets. Being relatively new, there are limited rules regarding them. Concerns regarding e-scooters and e-bikes include their speed and safe use. These vehicles are silent and can approach quickly while bystanders and motorists do not notice. Riding requires that the rider is courteous and aware of pedestrian and motorists around them.

I do not want to see a bylaw introduced that would create rules for these vehicles. Firstly, I believe bylaws are feckless when we do not have proper enforcement in place. We have explored the hiring of a peace officer whether part-time or full-time and realize it would come with prohibitive costs and community push back. Secondly, I believe this is an educational opportunity. Many of the riders on e-scooters are young people having fun. We need parents to be responsible for the safety of their children with the rules of the road applied. Bicycle helmet use for riders under 16 is a law in Alberta, which includes e-scooters and e-bikes. Brain damage from a seemingly simple crash can be permanent. As an owner of an e-bike, I love the freedom it gives. Let us enjoy responsibly without cumbersome rules.

Updates & Bits and Pieces of Information:

Splash Park:

Nobleford's Splash Park will be open for the season, weather permitting, from approximately June 15th until beginning of school in September. **We kindly ask all users, especially parents and caregivers, to supervise children and speak with them about respectful use of the facilities.** Unfortunately, there has been ongoing vandalism throughout the park, particularly in the washrooms. If this continues, the Town may have no choice but to close the park. Let's all do our part to keep this space safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone.

Skate Park:

The skate park is located by the Community Complex at 112 Kipp Street. It features several ramps and structures and is open to all at any time. Our Public Works Staff will repair the cracks in the foundation and clean up the area before setting up the structures. It is also being said that the rink will receive a fresh coat of paint this summer!

2026 Property Taxes – Information for Residents

The 2026 Property Tax Notices have now been mailed to residents. Included with the notices is an updated Property Tax Brochure that explains how property taxes are calculated and distributed.

The Town of Nobleford would like to clarify that the Town's municipal mill rate has not increased from 2025. Council worked to maintain the same municipal tax rate as the previous year.

However, many residents will still notice an increase in their total property taxes due to factors outside of the Town's control, including:

- Significant increases to the Alberta School Foundation Fund requisition and the RCMP requisition
- Higher property assessments for many properties, largely due to increased market values and higher-priced property sales in their neighbourhood region.

Assessments are completed by an independent assessor using provincial standards. The Town of Nobleford does not determine individual property values or assessments.

It is also important to note that only approximately 49% of the total property taxes collected remain with the Town of Nobleford. The remaining portion is collected on behalf of the Province for education and policing requisitions.

Council remains committed to maintaining responsible budgeting while continuing to provide services and infrastructure for the community.

**New Staff Sergeant:**

“The Town of Coaldale is welcoming Staff Sergeant Malcolm Callihoo as the new Detachment Commander for the Coaldale/Picture Butte RCMP Detachment. Staff Sergeant Callihoo brings more than 27 years of experience with the RCMP, having served in all four RCMP Districts in Alberta. His career has included postings in First Nations communities, rural and remote northern communities, and municipal city-based policing environments, giving him a broad understanding of the different public safety needs and priorities that exist across the province.”

Staff Sergeant Callihoo attended Nobleford’s Regular Council Meeting on May 11, 2026, where he shared his vision of increasing RCMP visibility within local communities, including Nobleford, through more proactive patrols and community presence. Council appreciated his approach and commitment to strengthening relationships within the community.

Residents are encouraged to report non-emergency incidents by calling the RCMP non-emergency line at 310-RCMP (310-7267, no area code required). In situations involving suspicious activity, such as prowlers, residents are also asked, when possible, not to clean up or disturb the area immediately so that RCMP members may have an opportunity to gather evidence.

Staff Sergeant Callihoo also addressed ongoing concerns regarding ATVs and dirt bikes being operated within town limits. Residents are encouraged to note the times and locations where these activities most commonly occur and to report them so patrols can be focused during those periods. While enforcement and ticketing will occur when necessary, the current focus remains on education and promoting safe, respectful operation.

Nobleford & Lethbridge County receive joint NRED funding:



The Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County have received a \$100,000 grant from the Government of Alberta to complete a Joint Development Feasibility Study near the Highway 519 and Highway 23 intersection.

“Through the Northern and Regional Economic Development program, Alberta’s government is giving communities across the province the tools they need to attract investment, grow local economies and create jobs for hard-working Albertans,” said Joseph Schow, Minister of Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration. “We look forward to seeing how the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County use this funding to unlock new opportunities for economic development and employment.”

The study will explore the area’s potential for future commercial and industrial development. Located within the Town and County’s Intermunicipal Development Plan boundary, the site is well positioned near key transportation routes, municipal servicing and agri-food processors.

While the area has strong development potential, there are current barriers to investment, including uncertainty around infrastructure capacity, land servicing, and market demand. The study will help both municipalities better understand what is needed to support coordinated, investment-ready growth.

The joint study will:

- Evaluate current infrastructure capacity and identify opportunities for shared servicing strategies.
- Assess land suitability for development.
- Conduct a market demand analysis to understand regional economic potential.
- Complete a financial analysis to assess the viability of infrastructure investment and long-term servicing models.
- Explore governance and cost-sharing models for future growth coordination.

It is anticipated that work on the study will begin in June and be completed by Spring 2027.

The Town and County see value in pursuing joint development opportunities that maximize infrastructure investment and position the region as a competitive, collaborative destination for economic growth.

"This grant is a great opportunity for both the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County," says Town of Nobleford Mayor Joan Boeder. "Development like this does not happen in isolation, and we are excited to work alongside the County to understand what this area could become. When neighbouring municipalities collaborate, everyone benefits. We are looking forward to seeing what this study unlocks for our region."

"We recognize how critical regional collaboration is to attracting growth and investment," says Lethbridge County Reeve Tory Campbell. "This study opens the door to cost-effective, scalable servicing solutions that can benefit both municipalities. When we plan for the future together, we can build on our shared strengths, remove barriers to investment, and create long-term opportunities for our region."

Funding for this study is provided by the Government of Alberta through the Northern and Regional Economic Development (NRED) program, which supports projects that promote economic development and diversification in Alberta. This joint feasibility study supports the strategic visions of both Lethbridge County and the Town of Nobleford by laying the groundwork for coordinated, investment-ready development.

FIRE / RESCUE SERVICES

We are a 100% volunteer-based department that responds to all call types including but not limited to;

- Structure / Vehicle Fires
- Motor Vehicle Collisions
- Wildland / Grassland Fires
- Medical First Response
- Hazardous Materials Response
- Citizen Assists
- All other Fire / Rescue Emergencies

Our members respond to any type of emergency at all times of the day and night year-round. When you see our units leaving the Fire Station, or on the roadway, we are enroute to any specified emergency scene. Our members constantly sacrifice time away from family, work, weekends, family functions, holidays, birthdays, anniversaries and almost every other type of event you can think of not go help people in need. They do this for the care of the people that live and travel through this great community.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

Under AHS /MFR program (Medical First Response), we train and respond to all medical call types.

Below is a description of our Medical Response:

- We fall under a medical director
- We have on call teams for each week of the month, in rotation of 5 teams of 204 members, with an officer in lead. (For evening shifts 9pm-5am)
- We offer all PPE / equipment needed for our first responders
- We care and package patients involved in MVC's
- Provide all pre hospital treatment prior to ambulances arrival
- MFR – Standard First Aid – HCP / AED providers (Level of Care)
- We have been trained in opioid responses with Narcan
- Pandemic response plans are identified by AHS and our members are up to date with proper procedures.

We respond accordingly based on our SOP'S for the following baseline medical response levels:

3 Cups Navy Beans, soaked & cooked

Ingredients

¼ cup Prairie Hill Farms Potato Granules

 2 cups All Purpose Flour
 1 tsp Salt
 3 Tbsp Cold Butter

1/3 cup Milk (and a little more to brush on tops)
 1 Egg
 1/4 cup Sugar (and a little more to sprinkle on top)
 3/4 cup Haskap Raisins

Directions

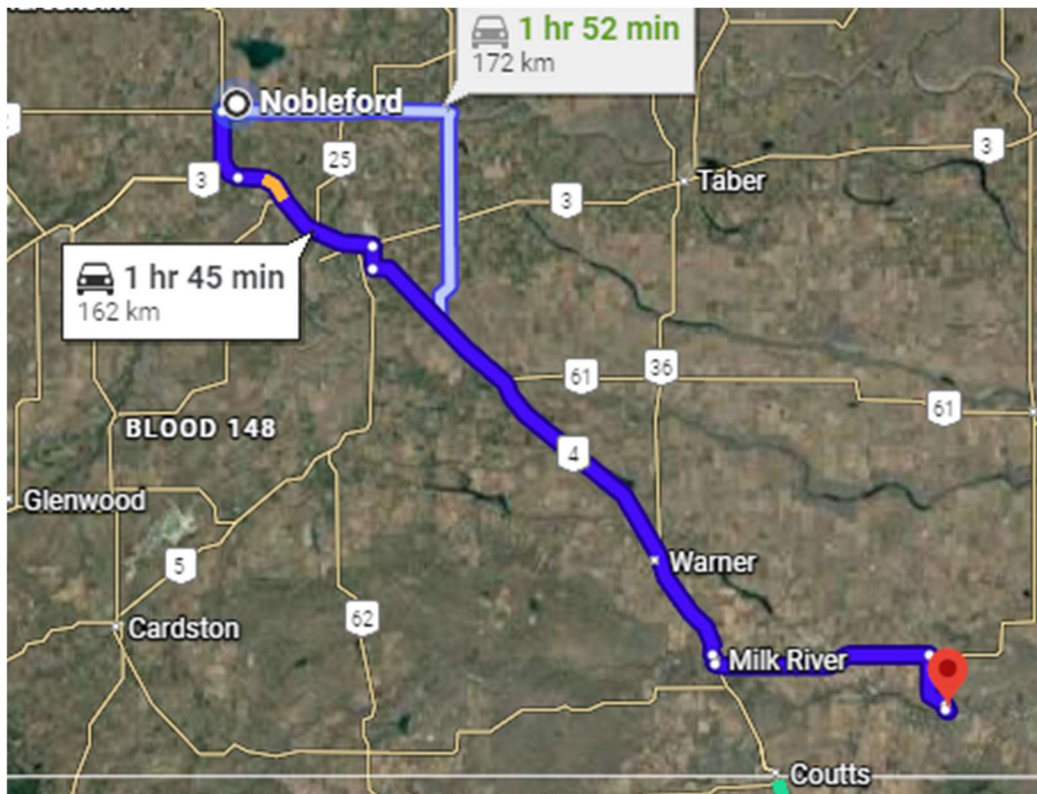
1. Mix potato granules with hot water and stir until thick and smooth. Let cool.
2. In another bowl, combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add haskap raisins and mix.
3. Add egg and milk to potatoes and stir into crumb mixture. Turn onto floured surface, knead gently until no longer sticky.
4. Pat dough into a 9 inch round (23 cm), about ¼ in thick (2 cm). Cut into 10-12 wedges. Place wedges on parchment lined baking sheet. Brush tops with milk. Bake at 400°F for 15-18 minutes or until golden brown.

Councillor's Corner:

Greetings from Deputy Mayor Bill Oudshoorn

Spring is morphing into summer, and this brings out the fun-lovers, and the topic for this article is one that arises every spring and discussion has occurred in council:

It pertains to off road vehicles and electric scooters being driven on our streets. Offroad vehicles such as non-licenced motorcycles and ATVs (quads and side-by-sides) are often seen driving on the streets, and often without riders wearing helmets and also with multiple riders. These vehicles are not legal for street or highway use and fall under the Traffic Act, meaning a peace officer or police officer can ticket riders. The Town of Nobleford cannot enforce the Traffic Act. This was discussed when the RCMP made their visit at the previous council meeting.

We are policed from the detachment in Coaldale, which has a new commanding Staff Sergeant, who has committed to increase patrol in Nobleford. Personally, I have seen an increased police presence over the past weeks. Let's hope this continues.

Electric scooters and e-bikes are legal to be used on our streets. Being relatively new, there are limited rules regarding them. Concerns regarding e-scooters and e-bikes include their speed and safe use. These vehicles are silent and can approach quickly while bystanders and motorists do not notice. Riding requires that the rider is courteous and aware of pedestrian and motorists around them.

I do not want to see a bylaw introduced that would create rules for these vehicles. Firstly, I believe bylaws are feckless when we do not have proper enforcement in place. We have explored the hiring of a peace officer whether part-time or full-time and realize it would come with prohibitive costs and community push back. Secondly, I believe this is an educational opportunity. Many of the riders on e-scooters are young people having fun. We need parents to be responsible for the safety of their children with the rules of the road applied. Bicycle helmet use for riders under 16 is a law in Alberta, which includes e-scooters and e-bikes. Brain damage from a seemingly simple crash can be permanent. As an owner of an e-bike, I love the freedom it gives. Let us enjoy responsibly without cumbersome rules.

Updates & Bits and Pieces of Information:

Splash Park:

Nobleford's Splash Park will be open for the season, weather permitting, from approximately June 15th until beginning of school in September. **We kindly ask all users, especially parents and caregivers, to supervise children and speak with them about respectful use of the facilities.** Unfortunately, there has been ongoing vandalism throughout the park, particularly in the washrooms. If this continues, the Town may have no choice but to close the park. Let's all do our part to keep this space safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone.

Skate Park:

The skate park is located by the Community Complex at 112 Kipp Street. It features several ramps and structures and is open to all at any time. Our Public Works Staff will repair the cracks in the foundation and clean up the area before setting up the structures. It is also being said that the rink will receive a fresh coat of paint this summer!

2026 Property Taxes – Information for Residents

The 2026 Property Tax Notices have now been mailed to residents. Included with the notices is an updated Property Tax Brochure that explains how property taxes are calculated and distributed.

The Town of Nobleford would like to clarify that the Town's municipal mill rate has not increased from 2025. Council worked to maintain the same municipal tax rate as the previous year.

However, many residents will still notice an increase in their total property taxes due to factors outside of the Town's control, including:

- Significant increases to the Alberta School Foundation Fund requisition and the RCMP requisition
- Higher property assessments for many properties, largely due to increased market values and higher-priced property sales in their neighbourhood region.

Assessments are completed by an independent assessor using provincial standards. The Town of Nobleford does not determine individual property values or assessments.

It is also important to note that only approximately 49% of the total property taxes collected remain with the Town of Nobleford. The remaining portion is collected on behalf of the Province for education and policing requisitions.

Council remains committed to maintaining responsible budgeting while continuing to provide services and infrastructure for the community.

**New Staff Sergeant:**

“The Town of Coaldale is welcoming Staff Sergeant Malcolm Callihoo as the new Detachment Commander for the Coaldale/Picture Butte RCMP Detachment. Staff Sergeant Callihoo brings more than 27 years of experience with the RCMP, having served in all four RCMP Districts in Alberta. His career has included postings in First Nations communities, rural and remote northern communities, and municipal city-based policing environments, giving him a broad understanding of the different public safety needs and priorities that exist across the province.”

Staff Sergeant Callihoo attended Nobleford’s Regular Council Meeting on May 11, 2026, where he shared his vision of increasing RCMP visibility within local communities, including Nobleford, through more proactive patrols and community presence. Council appreciated his approach and commitment to strengthening relationships within the community.

Residents are encouraged to report non-emergency incidents by calling the RCMP non-emergency line at 310-RCMP (310-7267, no area code required). In situations involving suspicious activity, such as prowlers, residents are also asked, when possible, not to clean up or disturb the area immediately so that RCMP members may have an opportunity to gather evidence.

Staff Sergeant Callihoo also addressed ongoing concerns regarding ATVs and dirt bikes being operated within town limits. Residents are encouraged to note the times and locations where these activities most commonly occur and to report them so patrols can be focused during those periods. While enforcement and ticketing will occur when necessary, the current focus remains on education and promoting safe, respectful operation.

Nobleford & Lethbridge County receive joint NRED funding:



The Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County have received a \$100,000 grant from the Government of Alberta to complete a Joint Development Feasibility Study near the Highway 519 and Highway 23 intersection.

“Through the Northern and Regional Economic Development program, Alberta’s government is giving communities across the province the tools they need to attract investment, grow local economies and create jobs for hard-working Albertans,” said Joseph Schow, Minister of Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration. “We look forward to seeing how the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County use this funding to unlock new opportunities for economic development and employment.”

The study will explore the area’s potential for future commercial and industrial development. Located within the Town and County’s Intermunicipal Development Plan boundary, the site is well positioned near key transportation routes, municipal servicing and agri-food processors.

While the area has strong development potential, there are current barriers to investment, including uncertainty around infrastructure capacity, land servicing, and market demand. The study will help both municipalities better understand what is needed to support coordinated, investment-ready growth.

The joint study will:

- Evaluate current infrastructure capacity and identify opportunities for shared servicing strategies.
- Assess land suitability for development.
- Conduct a market demand analysis to understand regional economic potential.
- Complete a financial analysis to assess the viability of infrastructure investment and long-term servicing models.
- Explore governance and cost-sharing models for future growth coordination.

It is anticipated that work on the study will begin in June and be completed by Spring 2027.

The Town and County see value in pursuing joint development opportunities that maximize infrastructure investment and position the region as a competitive, collaborative destination for economic growth.

"This grant is a great opportunity for both the Town of Nobleford and Lethbridge County," says Town of Nobleford Mayor Joan Boeder. "Development like this does not happen in isolation, and we are excited to work alongside the County to understand what this area could become. When neighbouring municipalities collaborate, everyone benefits. We are looking forward to seeing what this study unlocks for our region."

"We recognize how critical regional collaboration is to attracting growth and investment," says Lethbridge County Reeve Tory Campbell. "This study opens the door to cost-effective, scalable servicing solutions that can benefit both municipalities. When we plan for the future together, we can build on our shared strengths, remove barriers to investment, and create long-term opportunities for our region."

Funding for this study is provided by the Government of Alberta through the Northern and Regional Economic Development (NRED) program, which supports projects that promote economic development and diversification in Alberta. This joint feasibility study supports the strategic visions of both Lethbridge County and the Town of Nobleford by laying the groundwork for coordinated, investment-ready development.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

- We offer all PPE / equipment needed for our first responders

- We have been trained in opioid responses with Narcan
- Pandemic response plans are identified by AHS and our members are up to date with proper procedures.

LUCO FARMS WHITE BEAN SALAD

🕒 5 minutes

👥 8 servings

Ingredients

3 Cups Navy Beans, soaked & cooked
 ½ Cup Green Onions, thinly sliced
 ¼ Cup Kalamata Olives, sliced & pitted
 ¼ Cup Sun-dried Tomatoes, chopped & drained
 1 Tbsp Fresh Rosemary, chopped
 2 Tbsp Vinegar (sherry, cider or balsamic)

2 Tbsp Luco Farms Mustard (Prairie Lightning if you like heat!)
 ½ tsp Salt
 1/8 tsp Fresh Ground Black Pepper
 ¼ Cup Olive Oil

Directions

1. Combine beans, onions, olives, tomatoes and rosemary in a medium bowl and set aside.
2. Beat vinegar, mustard, salt & pepper in a small bowl with wire whisk until well blended.
3. Gradually add oil, beating constantly.
4. Add to bean mixture; mix gently.



HASKAP POTATO SCONES

🕒 15 minutes (Prep)

🕒 15 minutes (Cook)

👥 10-12 servings

Ingredients

¼ cup Prairie Hill Farms Potato Granules
 1 cup Hot Water
 2 cups All Purpose Flour
 1 tsp Salt
 3 Tbsp Cold Butter

1/3 cup Milk (and a little more to brush on tops)
 1 Egg
 1/4 cup Sugar (and a little more to sprinkle on top)
 3/4 cup Haskap Raisins

Directions

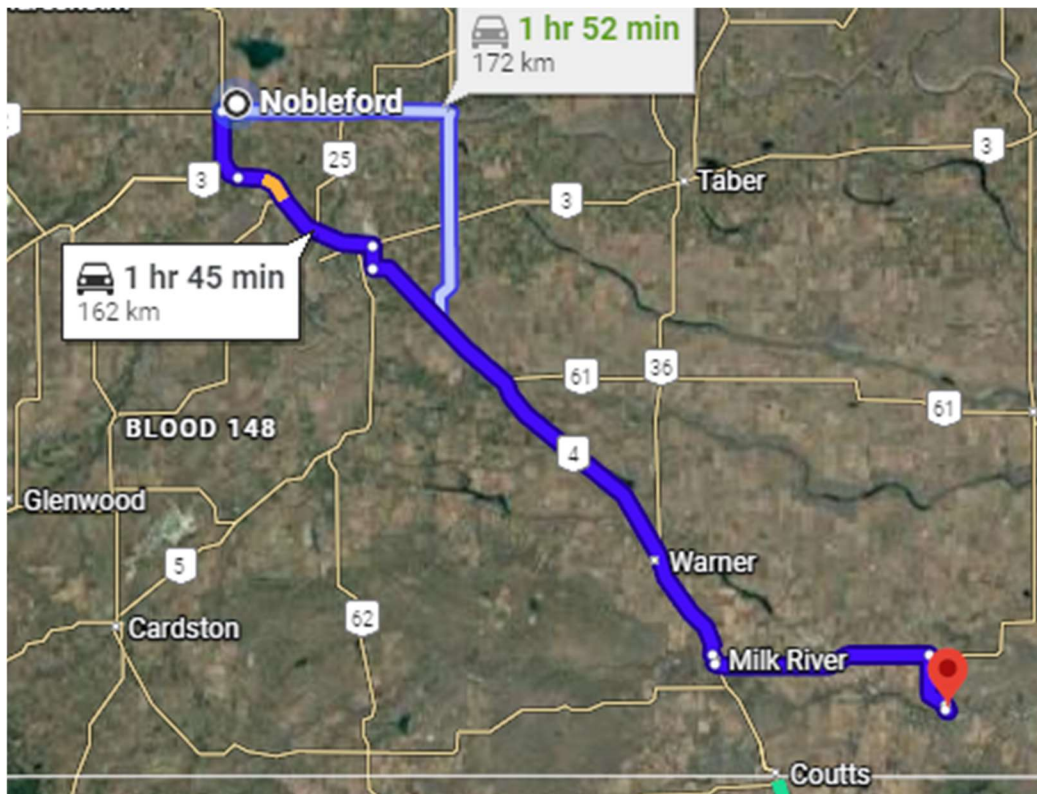
1. Mix potato granules with hot water and stir until thick and smooth. Let cool.
2. In another bowl, combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add haskap raisins and mix.
3. Add egg and milk to potatoes and stir into crumb mixture. Turn onto floured surface, knead gently until no longer sticky.
4. Pat dough into a 9 inch round (23 cm), about ¼ in thick (2 cm). Cut into 10-12 wedges. Place wedges on parchment lined baking sheet. Brush tops with milk. Bake at 400°F for 15-18 minutes or until golden brown.

House Maintenance Tips for the year - research-based, not from a professional!

June – Maintain comfort and prevent water issues

Interior Maintenance:

- Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Clean or replace furnace and A/C filters; schedule professional inspection if needed.
- Clean dryer vents.
- Re-seal granite countertops (every 6 months).
- Test sump pump.
- Inspect seals and caulking around windows and doors.

Exterior Maintenance

- Inspect roof shingles and flashing; clear gutters.
- Check foundation for settlement; maintain proper grading.
- Inspect decks and patios for rot or loose boards.
- Check for pest entry points and seal gaps.
